


Beyond the Book: Where Art _____Speaks for Us _____

Learning Beyond the Books

In the age of transcripts and AP exams, it is easy to have a misconception that all of our learning depends on textbooks. However some of the most transformative experiences happen not in libraries, but on stages, in debates, at conferences and in real world endeavors. As a student who has delved deep into the world of MUNs, public speaking and managing my own organization, I have come to realize that real learning happens outside the textbook.

Model United Nations: Diplomacy in Action

I started out as an excited delegate who was intrigued by international relations. I had no idea that this simulation would improve my critical thinking, research skills, and understanding of diplomacy. Each conference challenged more than just knowledge, it tested my ability to make strong arguments, react under pressure, and work together to tackle tough global issues.

I spent hours on research and needed to know about international relations and cultural sensitivity to represent countries on topics like nuclear disarmament and refugee crises. Beyond the facts, I learned how to think diplomatically, find common ground when opinions differ, and stay calm during intense question sessions. These are skills that can't be learned from a textbook, but they have been very helpful in both school and real-life situations.

Public Speaking: Finding My Voice

What used to cause me anxiety, public speaking has turned into a way to feel empowered through speeches, debates, and presentations. Speaking in front of others builds confidence, improves clear thinking, and encourages vulnerability while developing articulation skills..

Every opportunity taught me something about structure, persuasion, and the impact of voice. Whether I spoke at the start of a Model United Nations or debated on international stages through IDOS, I realized that genuine communication can leave a lasting mark. Over time, my fear of judgment faded. I became more empathetic, aware of what the audience needs, and sensitive to tone and body language.

I also learned the importance of listening in these situations. Presenting to an audience involves more than just sharing your argument; it also requires connecting with them, picking up on their signals, and adapting as needed. We learn to read in class. We learn to engage on stage.

Running an Organization: Learning by Leading

Starting and running my own student organization focused on organizing online MUNs globally has been one of the most eye-opening experiences. What began as a small idea developed into a platform that united diverse perspectives from several continents. I faced challenges in marketing, budgeting, team management, logistics, and, most importantly, leadership.

True leadership isn't just about making the right decisions at the right time, as seen in case studies. It's about motivating people with different skills and levels of motivation during tough times with limited resources. Each challenge provided a hands-on lesson in finding solutions and adapting, from creating agendas to dealing with technical issues during the conference.


I also learned to trust others, delegate tasks, and take responsibility for my mistakes. I understood the difference between a leader and a boss. While textbooks explain organizational frameworks, you only learn the details of communication, team building, and strategic thinking by actually being in charge.

Conclusion: The Real Curriculum

In its true sense, education is more than textbooks and tests. It shows up in the lively debates of delegates, the assured stance of speakers, and late-night talks among friends trying to create something important. These experiences outside the classroom shape us, push our limits, and highlight our strengths.

I learned diplomacy through Model United Nations, gained courage from public speaking, and built resilience through managing organizations. I will remember these lessons long after any test is over. As students, we owe it to ourselves to learn beyond the classroom; that's where real education happens.





Hello, my name is Rayed Qureshi, and I am 12 years old.


